“Pointing to Jesus”

He will come again in glory to judge the
living and the dead, and his kingdom will
have no end.
We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the
giver of life,
who proceeds from the Father,*
who with the Father and the Son is
worshiped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic
Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the
forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead,
and the life of the world to come. Amen.**

* When the Nicene Creed was written at the ecumenical councils of the 4th century, it stated that the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father.

The now-familiar phrase “and the Son” was added several centuries later by Western Christians without the approval of Eastern Christians, who have continued using the original wording. Debate over this addition became a source of division between the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches. In its ecumenical dialogues with Orthodox churches, the Episcopal Church agreed that future publications of the Creed would drop the phrase “and the Son” in solidarity with Eastern Christians as a sign of the church’s unity.

We pray for the sick, the suffering, and those in distress of any kind, especially Tom, Denny, Cindy, Zion, Mary Ann, Gene, Dan, Cheryl, and Sioux; that you would heal all injuries, comfort all grief, and settle all wrongs.

Come Lord Jesus, **and hear our prayer.**

In the fullness of time, O God, you sent your son, to be born of our sister Mary. And his name was Emmanuel: God With Us. We thank you for your Presence with us, and we pray that you might be always present with those whom we love but see no longer.




