A Community for Joy and Grief



Rejoice with those who rejoice; weep with those who weep."-Romans 12:15

As these words from Romans remind us, the church is meant to be a community where we celebrate with one another in moments of joy and support each other in times of hardship. While we are generally eager to rejoice on occasions of celebration, walking together in times of pain is no less essential to life as the body of Christ.

Certainly as we look towards the beginning of our program year, there will be ample opportunities for celebration. Our Parish Picnic will kick off the year with a time of food and fellowship. We will continue to celebrate the good work that has been accomplished through our Capital Campaign so far, including with an Appreciation Dinner in September for all those who have already made contributions. And in October, we will again hold a Children's Service designed to include the full participation of the kids of St. Timothy's.

This fall we will also have the opportunity as a community to consider a more painful subject—that of suicide. Suicide is a weighty topic and one best approached with care. Perhaps for these reasons, many churches never discuss it at all. Yet the number of people dealing with depression or other mental health issues continues to increase in our country. Suicide rates in the U.S. increased by 37% from 2000 to 2018.¹ Numerous families at St. Timothy's have been affected by suicide, either through the loss of a loved one or through suicide attempts. There is a stigma in our culture surrounding suicide that leaves many impacted individuals and families feeling isolated. The world's silence can be suffocating. But the church must be a place where even the most painful topics are discussed. Put simply: If we can't talk about suicide in the church, where can we?

September is Suicide Prevention Month, and on the weekend of the 14th-15th we will hold a special service—Breaking the Silence: A Service in Solidarity with Those Affected by Suicide. The category "affected by suicide" is a broad one, and so this worship service is meant to serve multiple purposes: to care for those who have struggled with suicidal thoughts, comfort those who have lost a friend or family member to suicide, and encourage those who seek to help loved ones dealing with suicidal thoughts. Ultimately, the goal is that people in any of these situations would know that the church is a community that will support and walk with them.

We will still hold Children Living the Word on September 15, so our younger children will be absent for the portion of the service dealing most directly with the topic of suicide. Older preteens and teens are certainly welcome in the service. They may well find the topic relevant, as studies show that more than 20% of teenagers have seriously considered suicide. It's certainly my intent that the service will address suicide in a sensitive manner appropriate to this age group, but parents should of course exercise their individual discretion in this matter.

As we move into our new program year, may we be a community where both our joy and our pain are shared, knowing that we walk this path together as one body in Christ.
